At the beginning of each semester, the Main Library of Tohoku University at Kawachi campus offers guidance and tours to newly arrived international students. This September 27th we held two consecutive library guidance tours in English for students who came from various countries from all over the world.

The guidance started with a detailed presentation given by International Student Concierge members who introduced the Tohoku University Library and its facilities in detail. They covered topics such as navigating the library, using the online public access catalog (OPAC) system, as well as accessing various helpful resources and services provided at the library, one of them being the International Student Concierge Desk which offers student support for international students in English, among other languages.

Following the presentation, the students were divided into smaller groups each

guided by an International Student Concierge member. During the tours, students were given a more hands-on introduction of various learning spaces in the library, such as the group study rooms, flexible working areas, the PC area, the lounge and quiet study places. Some students were especially impressed with the Global Learning Room which holds numerous Japanese books translated into English and several other languages. Their second favorite were the mysterious moving shelves of the Building 2.

The main goal of the library guidance is to help new students become familiar with various facilities and services that Tohoku University Library offers for their successful academic research. We hope to see many new students using the library and enjoying all the resources it provides.



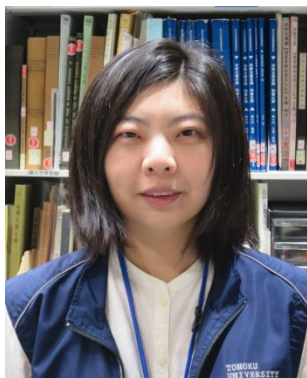

My Hometown: Los Barrios

In this column, we introduce the hometowns of our members, giving you a glimpse into their culture and some traveling tips from locals!

Hello, my name is Antonio and I am from Spain. In this section, I would like to introduce my hometown of Los Barrios, located in the southern province of Cadiz. Situated within the region known as 'El Campo de Gibraltar,' which includes several towns near the British territory of Gibraltar.

Los Barrios is a charming little town with a population of approximately 24,000 inhabitants, spread across a vast area of 331.49 km². The town is divided into two main areas: the urban center, where most residents reside and the majority of festivals are held, and the nearby Palmones area. Palmones is located close to a river with the same name that flows into the sea and is home to Palmones Beach, where visitors can enjoy a beautiful view of the Gibraltar. Additionally, the Palmones area is home to an industrial sector, playing a significant role in the economic growth of the entire Campo de Gibraltar region.

One of the most appealing aspects of Los Barrios is its breathtaking natural scenery. With small rivers, a beach, and scenic mountain trails, there are plenty of

opportunities for hiking and outdoor activities. One of my favorite hikes is 'La Garganta del Capitan', a path that leads through a valley, culminating in a refreshing spring and a small waterfall, making it a popular spot among locals and tourists alike.

Another highlight of Los Barrios is its traditional festivals, such as the 'Romeria' and 'La Virgen del Carmen.' These celebrations are deeply rooted in the town's Catholic heritage, though people of all backgrounds are welcome to participate. The Romeria is the most anticipated event of the year and requires months of preparation. Groups and associations in the town create beautifully decorated carts, which are pulled by tractors or horses. The carts slowly ascend a mountain, and the journey takes almost an entire day. Throughout the trip, people sing, dance, and enjoy refreshments. For the youngest attendants (although everyone can join) the event culminates with an all-night party at the end of the path, where the entire town comes together to celebrate.

Another important event is 'La Virgen del Carmen,' honoring the patron saint of seafarers. In summer, a large statue of the Virgin is carried through the Palmones river down to the sea. For religious residents, this event is incredibly meaningful and emotional.

Los Barrios is a town steeped in tradition, with warm and friendly residents. I highly recommend you try the delicious local cuisine and explore all that this town has to offer. Located just an hour and a half by car from the International Airport of Malaga, Los Barrios might be an interesting destination to visit during your next trip to Spain!

“Tomorrow is another day.”

The novel *Gone with the Wind* is set against the backdrop of the American Civil War (1861-1865) between the South and North over the expansion of slavery into the West, and Reconstruction (1865-1877), the post-war period. The story depicts a young woman, Scarlett O'Hara, the spoiled daughter of a Southern plantation owner, living through these turbulent times.

Gone with the Wind was popular with American readers from its release and it was the top American fiction bestseller in 1936 and 1937. More than 30 million copies have been printed worldwide. Mitchell received the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction for this book in 1937. It was adapted into the 1939 film of the same name, which is considered to be one of the greatest movies

ever made and it also received the Academy Award for Best Picture during the 12th Annual Academy Awards Ceremony.

Many readers have been captivated by the Scarlett's tenacity to lose to no man and the love story between her and Red. However, I prefer to focus on another angle of the story, which is the portrayal of white southerners and slavery. In 2020, another Black Lives Matter movement has erupted in America because of the murder of George Floyd. Then the movie *Gone with the Wind* was banned from screening because of racial discrimination.

Gone with the Wind is indeed an older novel, but it is worthy of being discussed no matter when, especially now with the development of racial discrimination. It surely deserves your attention.
