"Sophie's World" by Jostein Gaarder is a really interesting book that tells a story while also teaching about the big ideas from Western philosophy. It's about a girl named Sophie who gets these strange letters that ask her deep questions, like "Who? are you?" and "Where did everything come from?". These letters take her on a journey where she learns about different thinkers and their ideas, starting from the old-time philosophers like Socrates and Plato, and going up to the more recent ones like Descartes. It's a book that can be read at various levels, offering new insights with each reading. 
Manga Corner
