The Annual Open Campus, conducted by Tohoku University is one of the most anticipated events of the year. Every year, High School Students from Tohoku and Kanto regions come to Tohoku University with their schoolmates or with their parents or friends to see great minds at work.

"We came to Sendai by night bus from Kanazawa Station. It takes 9 hours to reach Sendai," said a second-year high school student from Kanazawa Nissui High School from Kanazawa City in Ishikawa Prefecture.

The Open Campus event is also a good opportunity for Tohoku University itself to showcase and promote their education facilities, departments, and various programs to high school students with crisp presentations about laboratory programs and activities.

At the same time, it was not just the departments in Tohoku University who were busy welcoming high school students during the event. The main library of Tohoku University located at its Kawauchi campus, also organized various programs, in order to introduce the rich educational facilities it offers.

During these two days, Kawauchi Main Library conducted three interactive activities: Student Discussion Booth, Stamp Rally Corner, and International Culture Presentation by the international students of Tohoku University. The Student Activate Library (SaL) corner helped high school students in answering their questions related to their interest in Tohoku University Entrance Exam, library, education, etc.

High School Students who visited the main library also enjoyed the stamp rally activity. "Through collecting stamps, the high school students can explore the main library even more effectively," explained Ms. Nishimura, a Tohoku University Main Library staff. "We put six stamps in different locations in the library and high school students will have to find them. After they have collected all of the six stamps, they will get a Tohoku University Main Library clear file and also will write their hopes and dreams on an *Ema*"

The International Students Concierge Interactive Corner facilitated interaction between high school students and foreigners through an event called "International Festival in Library". The number of international students in Tohoku University has been increasing every year. As of May 2017, there are almost 2027 foreign students in Tohoku University. This has encouraged the establishment of International Student's Concierge facility in Tohoku University Main Library in order to assist the foreign Students in using various library facilities.

"We who with disgusting, cold indifference prostitute that which is the source of inspiration, energy and enlighten, are in this way lower than animals. Here the judicial legality of our own relationships cannot save us."

Despite having become one of the most read soviet authors of the 1920s and 1930s, Panteleimon Sergeyevich Romanov is one of the least known Russian authors. The reason was the nature of his work, considered to be graphic and conspicuously explicit by contemporary standards. Romanov was born on July 24 1884 in what is now Tula Oblast. He studied Law at Moscow State University, after graduating; he dedicated himself to his develop his manuscripts.

He published his first book in 1911, but it had feeble impact and scarce recognition. The staple feature of his first works was the tendency to humorously describe "the ignorance, inefficiency and cowardice of the new Soviet bureaucrats and their aides" along with satirical stories of "how the peasants greeted the political changes in the region". With the passage of time, his work became obsidian, and consequently more sustained.

Even though his epics cemented his place among the Soviet writers of the time, they are virtually unknown in other countries. On the contrary, his short stories awarded him international recognition, especially in the western countries.

"Without cherry blossom" written in 1929, is one of the most controversial works of Romanov. In it, he portraits the social revolution, which lead to monumental modifications in the cotemporary couples. The role of the single mother, the consequences of the "abolition of

the sacrament of marriage", the new relationships between college youth, the shame of being an "unblemished flower" in the mid 20s, "free love" as the norm and love as a disease. As controversial as some may consider it, this short book depicts the monumental social change that took place in the Russian empire due to the 1917 revolution. In addition, it's written in a pleasantly descriptive, yet well balanced style. It is definitely a must read.


Yang's corner "An evening in the library"
