This section introduces a new book from our available selection at the Tohoku University Main Library. It is intended to pick your interest and fill your grey matter with intellect and emotion. Sit back and enjoy it!

One of the New York Times Bestsellers, *Diary of a Wimpy Kid*, is the very first book in the series of fiction books written by American author and cartoonist, Jeff Kinney. It is a novel in cartoon illustrations. From the very first page until the last one, the book brings the reader along with the fascinating diary of a kid. The book is written from the point of view of a middle school pre-teen kid called Greg Heffley. You are placed inside the head of the kid from the moment you start reading, and you will get to know how a middle school boy sees the world and thinks. If you love comedy, this is the book you should surely reach to, relax, and have yourself a lot of long quiet smiles throughout reading the book.

There are a lot of fascinating and adventurous days in Greg's secret diary, which he claims as a journal rather than a diary. There are days like the one about the notorious tricks that the kids did to each other, for example, the "Cheese Touch Games" that they played among themselves. They created the idea that the person being touched with that moldy and nasty cheese would be stuck with it until it was passed on to others by touching them. Kids have endless stories to annoy each other and play with each other. Once in a summer vacation, at one midnight, Greg was tricked by his wicked cousin's brother, Rodrick, that it was the time for them to go to school because summer vacation was over. Rodrick's trick was convincing, since

Greg saw the alarm clock set on purpose and Rodrick himself was dressed up for school. Greg did not realize the trick until his dad finally came and yelled at him because he was making breakfast at 3 a.m. in the morning and preparing to leave for school.

The most fascinating thing we get from this book might be how a pre-teen boy sees life. What is important to him? Of course, things like to get as many candies as possible in Halloween trick-or-treat, to wear an amazing costume in Halloween, to look popular among girls the same age at school, to play video games, not to get bullied by bigger kids at school, and so on are the most important things going on in this boy's daily life. It is also very lovely to read about the special bond of friendship between Greg and his neighbor friend Rowley, who always puts up with his notorious and playful plans.

One of the reasons that this story is engaging and interesting is because of the protagonist of the story, Greg. We are attracted to Greg's unique personality. There are times he is sly and notorious. There are times he is too wise and impressively handling challenges on his own way, and there are times when he is thoughtful and emotional. The combination of these personalities creates such a wonderful and creative narrative with a clever kid as the main subject of this novel.

It is a small and lovely town that contains all the memories of my childhood. Muar is a place located in Johore state, about 50 km away to the south from Malacca, the famous historical state in Malaysia. Muar is also called Bandar Maharani or literally the town of the empress named Maharani Fatimah. Muar is a historical town that is believed to have been existed before the presence of the Malacca sultanate around the 14th century. Now, Muar consists of about 350 thousand population made up of Malays, Chinese and Indians. It is famous for its food, coffee and historical prewar buildings.

When talking about food in Muar, everyone in Malaysia will think of *Otak-otak*. *Otak-otak* is fish cake made of ground fish meat mixed with spices such as coconut milk and chili, wrapped into a leaf parcel. The *otak-otak* is normally served by grilling or steaming according to one's preference. For me, I prefer the grilled one as shown in the picture below.

Besides *otak-otak*, *Muar* is also famous for the Chinese street food such as dumplings, *dim-sum* (a kind of Cantonese food normally served as breakfast), noodles, Hainanese chicken rice, and so on. Craving for Malay and Indian food? No problem. There are also restaurants serving nice *nasi lemak* (coconut milk rice with spicy sambal sauce) and *roti canai* (Indian bread with curry sauce).
