## Reader's Choice: What to Read Next?

This section introduces a book from our available selection at the Tohoku University Main Library. It is intended to pique your interest and fill your grey matter with intellect and emotion. Sit back and enjoy it!

Among the many branches of literature, speculative fiction has gained the favor of many readers by virtue of its unique writing style and reading pleasure. The first speculative fiction I read was Agatha Christie's "And Then There Were None", a representative of the mystery genre. During her lifetime, she wrote 80 detective novels and short story collections, 19 screenplays, and 6 novels published under the pen name 'Mary Westmacott'. The sheer number of her books is second only to Shakespeare.

The novel "And Then There Were None" tells the story of a serial murder case that happened on a deserted island, called "Black Island", where eight people who have never known each other are invited. Upon their arrival, they are greeted only by the butlers, Mr. and Mrs. Rogers. During dinner, the gramophone in the dining room suddenly sounds, accusing the guests, the butler and his wife of murder. The nightmare begins when one of the guests suddenly dies.

In this work Agatha's writing style is very subtle, she utilizes multiple narrators to create a blind spot in the reading, making it difficult for the reader to guess who the real murderer is. The story takes place on an isolated island surrounded by the sea with no assistance, and the closed environment creates an atmosphere of treachery and panic, which immerses the read-

ers in it and makes them unable to extricate themselves from the situation. This model is also known as the "Closed circle of suspects".

Impressively, at the end of the novel, the author reveals the truth of the whole story through the confession of the murderer, and with the death of the murderer, the story finally closes the loop like an Ouroboros. The exploration of crime and punishment, justice and law left behind by the work also triggers deeper thoughts: what should people do when the law fails to administer justice?

# My Hometown: General Roca city, northern Patagonia (Argentina)

In this column, we introduce the hometowns of our members, giving you a glimpse into their culture and some traveling tips from locals!

Let me introduce you to my hometown named General Roca, located in the Province of Rio Negro, in the northern part of Argentina. It is a city of about 380,000 inhabitants and although it's not very known in the Patagonia, it has many beautiful places to enjoy.

Rio Negro province means "Black River" in English, and is one of the largest rivers in the Patagonia Region. This river is divided into three areas: High Valley, Medium Valley and Lower Valley. General Roca is in the High Valley, which is the Argentina's main fruit exporting area. The city is specially known for its apple production (they are delicious!). Each February the National Apple Festival is celebrated in my hometown, where you can enjoy local products and shows from national and regional artists.

Another interesting place my hometown is called "Canal Grande Park". which is the main irrigation canal that allows the city's productive lands to be irrigated. Part of this irrigation canal was paved in 2006, with pedestrian paths, metal safety railings and lighting that transformed the appearance of this area of the city, becoming a tourist attraction. It was very nice to see that transformation personally, since I lived right in front of the canal and I was able to observe the change before and after the renovation.

The last place I'm going to introduce is the Red Moon Valley and is one of my favorite places in my hometown. Actually, there are four Valleys of the Moon in Argentina. And two of these are in General Roca city! They are called Red Moon Valley and Yellow Moon valley and are located about 22 km from the city center. Although both are really beautiful, my favorite one is the Red Moon Valley due to its vibrant colors.

In Spanish we call this form of landscape as "bardas", and they constitute an extreme version of the desert because the ground is almost devoid of vegetation. The appearance of these *bardas* resembles Mars due to the red soil, and the wind and scarce rains that shape it. The Red Moon

Valley is within a municipal protected area, since its soils are rich in fossil deposits, becoming an area of strong paleontological interest.
